INTRODUCTION

REVIEW Jonah 1:1–16
Jonah 1:17–2:10
Jonah 3:1–10
NEW EXPOSITION: ROUND 1 God's grace toward Nineveh enraged Jonah (4:1)
Jonah complained in his prayer that he had already said in Israel that God is so gracious and merciful that He relents from judgment (4:2)

Jonah petitioned the Lord to take his life from him, because he preferred to die (4:3)
The Lord asked Jonah whether his anger was righteous (4:4)
ROUND 2 Jonah went east of the city & built a shade, to watch what would happen to the city (4:5)
The Lord appointed a shade plant to relieve Jonah's misery, making him happy (4:6)
Early the next morning, God appointed a worm to attack the plant & it withered (4:7)

That day, the Lord prepared a strong Santa Ana wind (that blew over his shelter?) and the sun beat on Jonah's head, so he wished death for himself (4:8)
God asked Jonah whether his anger was righteous, to which he replied that his anger is so righteous that he was willing to die for it $(4:9)$
The Lord reminded Jonah that he pitied a plant for which he did not cause to grow and which existed only briefly (4:10)
The Lord compared Jonah's pity on the plant with His own pity for the great Nineveh with 120,000 (who lack even the discernment that children normally possess) plus livestock (4:11)
If it was right for Jonah to pity the plant, surely it is right for God to do so
